História Comparada dos Impérios: configurações políticas e culturais

Mini-curso (Setembro de 2013)

A proposta do curso é expor as distintas variantes de entidades consideradas como imperiais, com particular atenção para as relações entre práticas e instituições políticas, representações que as legitimam, e as respostas por parte daqueles que por ela são visados (os súditos/sujeitos propriamente imperiais). A questão sempre presente é: o que define as diversas entidades propostas como propriamente imperiais frente aos problemas que estas mesmas entidades consideravam como aqueles mais relevantes para a definição de sua identidade política. Para além do binómio “extenso e variado”, de que se fala realmente quando se fala de império? Qual a elasticidade do conceito antes que perca sua validade como ferramenta conceitual? Ou, em outros termos, o que há de comum entre os casos Qing e Britânico, por exemplo, para que ambos mereçam tal qualificação? Faz sentido falar em impérios antigos e modernos, sendo império uma categoria essencialmente política? Neste sentido, os assim chamados impérios atlânticos são confrontados com outros tipos de império que enfrentaram problemas semelhantes quanto à incorporação de vastos territórios e grupos étnicos marcadamente distintos.

Programa

1. História comparada dos impérios: repertórios e temas imperiais.
2. A mais longa tradição imperial: a estratégia Han e Manchu de reconstrução imperial e o diálogo com os “bárbaros” nômades.
3. Um império na encruzilhada de três mundos: a solução otomana para o problema da diversidade imperial.
4. Um império periférico: a expansão russa e o problema étnico.
5. O que há de imperial no império espanhol: práticas governativas e representações políticas.
6. Um império contestado: o debate em torno da natureza do império britânico durante o século XVIII.
